Common Causes and Their Solutions

Step-by-Step Troubleshooting Guide

If you are experiencing repeating crashes, overcome the following troubleshooting actions systematically.

1. Validate the Integrity of Game Files

With time, game files can become corrupted due to unexpected system shutdowns, incomplete updates, or faulty storage drives. Steam has an integrated tool to check and change missing or broken files.

- Open the **Steam Library**.
- Right-click on **CS: GO** and select **Properties**.
- Browse to the **Local Files** tab.
- Click **Verify Integrity of Game Files**.
- Wait for the process to surface (Steam will automatically download any corrupted files), then reboot your computer.

2. Update or Roll Back Graphics Drivers

Your graphics card chauffeur is the bridge between your hardware and CS: GO. Outdated or damaged drivers are a primary source of video game instability.

- **NVIDIA Users:** Open GeForce Experience or check out the official NVIDIA website to download the current Game Ready Driver.

- *Pro Tip:* If the crashes began right away after a driver update, utilize a tool like **Display Driver Uninstaller (DDU)** in Safe Mode to totally clean the old driver before installing a stable, older version.

3. Change Launch Options

Specific launch alternatives can force CS: GO to run in a more stable environment, bypassing introduction videos or forcing particular DirectX modes.

- Go to your Steam Library, right-click **CS: GO**, and select **Properties**.
- Under the **General** tab, search for **Launch Options**.
- Get in the following suggested stable commands (separated by spaces):
 - -novid (Skips the intro video, reducing load-time crashes)
 - -high (Sets CS: GO to high CPU priority)
 - -autoconfig (Resets video and performance settings to default if the video game declines to launch)

4. Run the Game as Administrator

Permissions problems can sometimes avoid CS: GO from accessing essential system files or conserving configuration modifications.



- Navigate to your CS: GO setup folder (usually C: \ Program Files (x86)\ Steam \ steamapps \ typical \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive).
- Locate the main executable file (csgo.exe).
- Right-click the file and select **Properties**.
- Go to the **Compatibility** tab and check **Run this program as an administrator**.
- Click Apply and OK.

5. Look For Background Application Interference

Overlay software and hardware monitoring tools frequently hook into the DirectX pipeline of games, which can trigger sudden crashes. Try disabling the following applications while playing:

- Discord Overlay
- NVIDIA GeForce Experience Overlay
- RivaTuner Statistics Server (RTSS) and MSI Afterburner
- Third-party antivirus software application (attempt adding an exemption for the Steam folder)

Advanced Troubleshooting

If fundamental repairs fail to fix the concern, the problem may lie deeper within your os or hardware setup.

1. Managing Overclocks and XMP Profiles

While overclocking your CPU, GPU, or RAM supplies a performance increase, CS: GO is notoriously conscious hardware instability.

- If you have actually applied an aggressive overclock, try dialing it back to baseline factory specs.
- If you are running high-speed RAM, test disabling your motherboard's **XMP (Extreme Memory Profile)** or **DOCP** in the BIOS to see if memory instability is triggering the crashes.

2. Reinstalling CS: GO Cleanly

Sometimes, leftover customized maps, outdated workshop products, or greatly customized configuration files cause relentless conflicts.

- Uninstall CS: GO through Steam.
- Manually navigate to the installation directory site (... steamapps \ typical \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive) and erase any staying folders.
- Reinstall a fresh copy of the game.
