

Hollyville is the kind of place people often drive through before they realize they have entered a community with its own quiet character. It sits in Sussex County with the easygoing pace that defines much of southern Delaware, yet there is more here than a pin on a map suggests. The area's story has been shaped by agricultural land, small-road living, seasonal rhythms, and the kind of practical traditions that hold a community together long after bigger places have started to feel anonymous.
