

Tequesta has a way of feeling both tucked away and surprisingly complete. It sits in northern Palm Beach County, close enough to the water that salt air becomes part of daily life, yet it still keeps the calm, village-like pace that draws people here in the first place. For visitors, it is easy to mistake Tequesta for a simple stop along the way to somewhere else. The most recognizable natural feature is the **Loxahatchee River**, one of Florida's most scenic waterways.
