high-efficiency units can reach 95% or higher. That number becomes important when repair costs begin stacking up. If a 22-year-old furnace with an 80% AFUE rating needs a major repair, the decision is different from replacing a capacitor or igniter on a newer 95% system.

Static pressure is the resistance to airflow inside a duct system, and high static pressure can shorten blower motor life, overheat furnaces, and leave upstairs bedrooms cold.

A high-efficiency furnace replacement in Ambler may require correct PVC vent sizing and slope. A boiler replacement in Doylestown may require careful attention to venting, near-boiler piping, pressure relief, and expansion capacity.
