

Medford sits in a part of Suffolk County that many people drive through without fully noticing, which is a shame because the area rewards a slower look. It has the feel of a place shaped by practical living, long commutes, seasonal traffic, and the steady pull of nearby parks, rail lines, and shoreline destinations. It is not a village built for spectacle.
