

Jessup does not try to charm you from the roadside. That is part of its appeal. Set between Baltimore and Washington, D.C., and stitched together by warehouses, older road corridors, rail lines, and stretches of suburban sprawl, Jessup is easy to miss if you are only looking for postcard scenery. Spend a little time here, though, and the place starts to make sense as a working landscape with a deep regional story. It is a town shaped by transportation, by the movement of goods and people, and by the practical rhythms that keep central Maryland running.

That gives Jessup a kind of understated value for travelers. You will not find a dense tourist district or a single signature attraction that dominates the map. Instead, the interest comes from the mix of geography and culture, from proximity to bigger destinations, and from the small details that tell you how the region functions.
