3. **User Traffic:** High traffic ensures that lobbies fill up quickly, decreasing wait times for public matches.
4. **Reputation and Longevity:** Check neighborhood forums, Trustpilot, and Reddit to determine the length of time the site has actually been active and whether users report smooth withdrawals.
