- Hidden return or resizing policies buried in tiny footer links

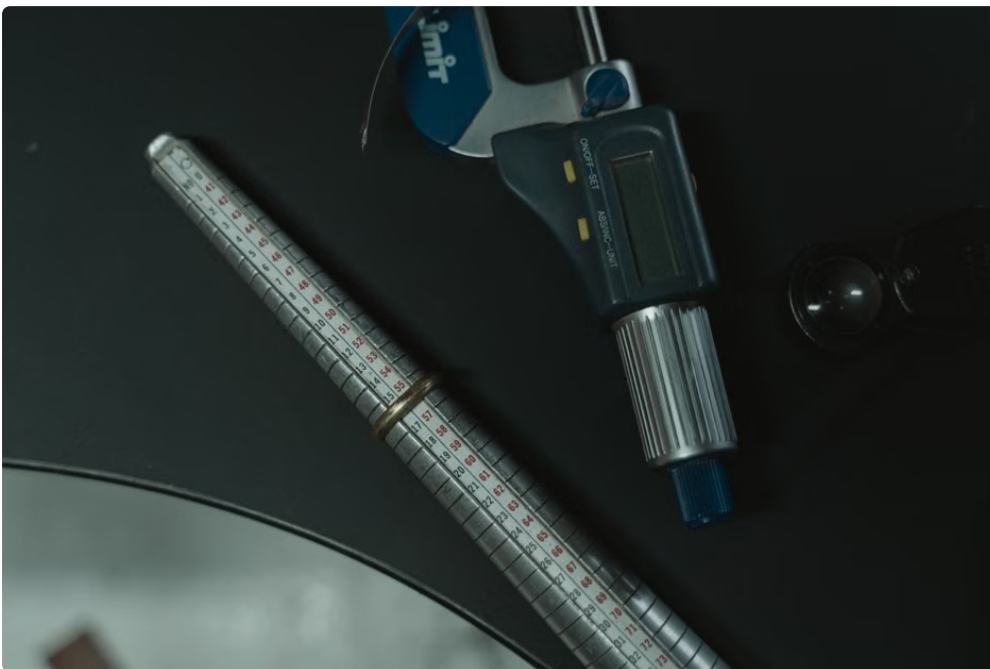

## Understanding the Four Cs Trade-Offs: Why Cut Drives Sparkle

When it comes to diamonds, the Four Cs—Carat, Cut, Color, and Clarity—define value and appearance. However, these characteristics are not equal in importance. For example, the Cut quality often has the greatest effect on a diamond's brilliance and sparkle.



### Cut vs. Carat Weight

Two diamonds may both weigh 1 carat but can look very different due to their cut quality and proportions. A well-cut diamond will reflect light beautifully, creating the signature sparkle, while a poorly cut diamond might appear dull or dark despite matching carat weight.

Of course, carat weight does influence price, but don't get fixated on it alone without checking cut grades and measurements listed in the GIA grading report.

### Color and Clarity

- **Color:** Near-colorless diamonds (G, H on the GIA scale) often represent great value unless you specifically want a completely colorless or fancy hue.

- **Clarity:** Most inclusions are invisible to the naked eye under 10x magnification. Reliable reports like GIA's show where inclusions lie, helping you balance price and appearance.

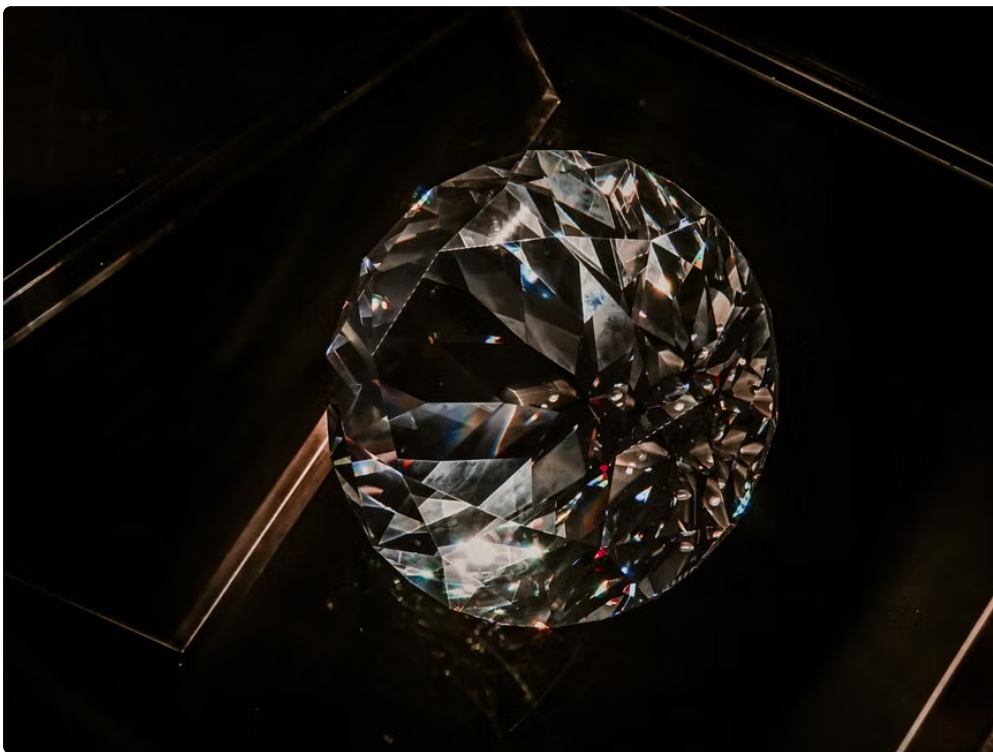
## Carat vs Visible Size: The Importance of Measurements and Proportions

**Attribute** Carat Weight **Visible Size** (Diameter/Length) **Definition** The weight of the diamond in metric carats (1 carat = 200 mg) **Actual measurements** such as diameter (for round diamonds) or length and width (for fancy shapes) **Impact on Appearance** Heavier diamonds tend to be pricier but not always bigger looking **Shallow or deep cuts** dramatically affect how large a diamond appears **Typical Measurement Ranges** Example: 1.0 carat Diameter approx. 6.4–6.5 mm for a well-cut round diamond of 1 carat

Measurements and proportions in the GIA report are the real keys to understanding the diamond's presence on your finger! A deep-cut 1.0 carat diamond could have a smaller table diameter [diamond measurements mm](#) than a well-cut 0.9 carat stone.

### Pro Tip:

Always cross-reference the carat weight with the exact measurements and ask for plotting diagrams in the GIA grading report to get a full picture of size and light performance.



## Shape and Perceived Size: Oval, Pear, Marquise vs Round

The shape of your diamond can make a substantial difference to how large it appears in comparison to its carat weight.

- **Oval, Pear, and Marquise Shapes:** These elongated cuts often look bigger than round diamonds of the same carat because their length draws the eye and covers more finger surface area.
- **Round Brilliant:** The traditional and most popular shape, prized for ideal light performance and sparkle. However, round diamonds sometimes look smaller for the same carat compared to fancy shapes.
