If a skin is voted on by the community and authorized by Facepunch, it gets contributed to the main Item Store for a limited time at a fixed base rate (generally ranging from £ 0.99 to £ 2.99).

Once removed from the official shop, these items transition to the **Steam Community Market** and third-party trading sites, where supply and need determine their costs.

3. **Visual Appeal and Tactical Utility:** Items that look visually striking or supply real gameplay benefits (like mixing into the environment) command higher rates.

1. Camouflage (Biomes)

Wearing bright neon pink or glowing green armor in a thick forest or snowy tundra is a quick method to get spotted and removed. Competitive gamers typically curate loadouts based on the biome they reside in:

- **Snow Biome:** Whiteout, Arctic, or pure white cloth skins lessen exposure.
- **Forest Biome:** Woodland, camouflage, or earthy green and brown tones assist gamers vanish into the treeline.

- **Be careful of Hype:** Just due to the fact that a streamer hypes up a newly launched skin does not indicate it will hold its value long-lasting. Search for ageless styles rather than short-term meme skins.
