- **The Auto-Cashout Strategy:** Players set a conservative multiplier (e.g., 1.2 x or 1.3 x) and rely on steady, incremental gains. While efficient in the short-term, a single instant-crash (1.00 x) can erase various little wins.
- **The Martingale System:** A timeless betting technique where a gamer doubles their bet after every loss, aiming to recuperate all previous losses plus a revenue when they lastly win. This needs a massive bankroll and often hits platform wagering limitations.
- **The High-Risk Sniper:** Waiting for a long streak of low crashes (e.g., a number of rounds ending under 1.5 x) under the false presumption that a "high multiplier is due."

The Illusion of Control and the Gambler's Fallacy
