The Steam Workshop Pipeline

1. **Production:** Community artists design skins utilizing 3D modeling software and upload them to the Steam Workshop.
2. **Community Voting:** Players vote on their favorite designs, pushing popular items to the attention of designers.
3. **Selection:** Facepunch curates a weekly batch of accepted skins.
4. **The Item Store:** Every Thursday, a new batch of skins is released on the main Rust Item Store for a repaired, low cost (usually ranging from £ 0.99 to £ 3.00).

When purchased from the main shop, these items have a one-week trade and market constraint. After that week, they get in the Steam Community Market, where supply and demand dictate their true value.

The Rust Skin Economy: Supply and Demand

The Rust skin market runs much like a real-world stock market. Rates vary based upon rarity, utility, and general gamer demand.

Aspects That Influence Skin Prices:
