Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Considerable wear, fading colors, and heavy scratching.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Very worn, often changing the graphic completely. <i>(Note: Some skins look distinctively cool in BS, called "Blackscars").</i>

StatTrak™ and Souvenirs

- **StatTrak™:** Items with this innovation feature an orange LED counter that tracks the number of confirmed eliminates made with that particular weapon.
- **Souvenir Packages:** These are dropped throughout main Valve-sponsored esports competitions (Majors) and feature gold sticker labels representing the groups and MVP of the round.

The Rarity Tiers

Valve arranges CS2 skins into standardized rarity tiers, which dictate how often they drop in-game or emerge from weapon cases.

1. **Consumer Grade (White):** Common, fundamental drops.
2. **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly much better than Consumer, common in containers.

3. **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** Standard lower-tier case drops.
4. **Limited (Purple):** Often forms the base ingredients for trade-ups.
5. **Categorized (Pink):** Highly detailed, preferable mid-tier skins.
6. **Covert (Red):** The greatest basic rarity found in cases, featuring the most elaborate designs.
