- **API Restrictions:** By limiting automated trade bots and enforcing trade cooldowns, Valve has actually made it significantly harder for platforms to process instant deposits and withdrawals.
- **Account Bans:** Users captured using their Steam inventories for industrial gambling operations risk having their individual Steam accounts completely prohibited, leading to the loss of their whole game and skin libraries.

Regardless of these efforts, the demand stays so high that new platforms continually emerge to replace those that shut down.

Responsible Practices for Enthusiasts
