1. Repairing a Sagging Door

If a door scrapes against the floor or refuses to lock effectively, it is most likely sagging at the hinges.

- **Step 3:** Replace it with a 3-inch wood screw. The longer screw will bite deep into the framing stud behind the jamb, pulling the door back into positioning.
- **Step 4:** Test the door. If it still droops, repeat the process on the middle hinge.

2. Getting Rid Of Squeaky Hinges

A squeaking door is a small annoyance that takes seconds to fix.

- **Step 1:** Avoid using cooking oil or basic household grease, which attracts dust and gums up the mechanism. Instead, use a silicone-based spray, white lithium grease, and even petroleum jelly.
- **Step 2:** Open and close the door a couple of times to work the lube into the hinge pin.
- **Action 3:** If the squeak persists, tap the hinge pin out utilizing a nail and a hammer, wipe it tidy with a rag, coat it lightly with lubricant, and tap it back into location.

3. Replacing Worn Weatherstripping

- **Action 2:** Clean the door jamb thoroughly to eliminate dirt and old adhesive residue.
