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When households begin looking at senior care, they normally visualize large assisted living communities, with long hallways, numerous dining rooms, and an occasions calendar that looks like a cruise ship schedule. Those settings work well for numerous older grownups. Yet families frequently tell me, after a few months, that something is missing: warmth, continuity, or a sense that personnel really understand their parent as an individual and not as "the fall risk in space 214."

That space is where small senior care homes, also called residential care homes or board-and-care homes in many states, quietly stand out.
