Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Considerable wear; paint is noticeably chipped and dull in major areas.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Heavy wear. The weapon looks greatly weathered, rusted, or damaged. (Note: Some skins look uniquely "cool" or "blackened-out" in high float BS).

It is worth keeping in mind that some skins are hardcoded to never ever appear in certain conditions. For example, a particular skin might only exist in Factory New and Minimal Wear conditions.

Rarity Tiers: From Consumer to Covert

Skins are categorized into different rarity tiers, which dictate how tough they are to obtain through random case drops or trade-ups.



- **Customer Grade (White):** Common, fundamental weapon surfaces.
- **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly less common than customer grade.
- **Mil-Spec Grade (Dark Blue):** The baseline tier for the majority of weapon case drops.
- **Restricted (Purple):** Noticeably rarer and frequently includes more detailed art work.
- **Categorized (Pink):** Highly desired skins with complicated styles.
- **Covert (Red):** The highest standard weapon tier, featuring iconic styles like the *AK-47|Redline* or *M4A4|Wraith* (Contraband).
- **Special Rare (Gold):** Knives and Gloves. These are the rarest and most pricey basic drops in the video game.
