- **The Anti-Martingale (Paroli) System:** Players double their bets after a *win* instead of a loss, trying to take advantage of winning streaks while decreasing damage during cold runs.
- **High-Risk Hunting:** Waiting for prolonged streaks of low crashes (e.g., numerous rounds under 1.50 x) and wagering high up on a viewed "high multiplier" coming soon. (Note: This succumbs to the Gambler's Fallacy; every round is an independent occasion).
