The wear condition is divided into 5 unique categories:

Wear Condition	Float Value Range	Visual Description
Factory New (FN)	0.00-- 0.07	Beautiful, perfect surface with little to no scratches.
Very Little Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Very small blemishes, typically near the edges or barrel.
Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Obvious wear, scratches, and fading. The most common condition.
Well-Used (WU)	0.38-- 0.58	Significant wear, scratches, and fading.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.58-- 1.00	Maximum wear, scratches, and fading.

Worn (WW) 0.38-- 0.45 Significant wear, heavy scratching, and visible paint chipping. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Extremely worn, rusted, or faded. Sometimes valued for distinct "blackimov" effects.

Keep in mind: Some skins are "capped," meaning they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower float variations extremely rare and pricey.

4. **Liquidity:** CS2 skins are remarkably liquid. Unlike physical antiques, they can be bought, sold, and traded instantly across worldwide markets, acting nearly like a digital commodity.
