Upon opening a case, the video game's server algorithm arbitrarily chooses one item from the case's predetermined drop swimming pool. The items range from typical Consumer Grade weapon finishes to ultra-rare, extremely coveted Special Items (knives and gloves).

- **Random Drops:** Players generally make approximately 2-3 drops per week by playing the game, which can include cases, graffiti, or low-tier weapon skins.

Active cases drop frequently after matches, while older cases move into the "rare drop swimming pool," indicating they drop incredibly occasionally (roughly a 1% opportunity after a match), triggering their market costs to increase in time.

Understanding Weapon Rarities and Odds

Every weapon skin and special product inside a CS: GO case is designated a specific rarity tier. These tiers dictate not just the visual style of the product however also the mathematical probability of unboxing it.

Rarity Tier Product Type Approximate Drop Rate **Mil-Spec** Standard Blue Skins ~ 79.92% **Restricted** Purple Skins ~ 15.98% **Classified** Pink Skins ~ 3.20% **Covert** Red Skins ~ 0.64% **Special Item** Knives/ Gloves ~ 0.26%

Additionally, every weapon skin dropped from a case features a **Wear Rating** (Float Value), identifying its condition from *Factory New* to *Battle-Scarred*, along with a possibility to be *StatTrak*™ (an integrated counter that tracks kills made with the weapon).

Over a decade of advancement, Valve launched dozens of cases. Some ended up being famous due to the stellar collection of skins they presented to the video game.

1. The CS: GO Weapon Case

Launched in 2013, this is where everything began. It introduced renowned community-designed classics like the **AWP|Lightning Strike** and the original batch of knife finishes. Today, unopened variations of this case trade for numerous dollars.

2. Operation Bravo Case

Introduced alongside Operation Bravo, this case featured the legendary **AK-47|Fire Serpent** and the **Desert Eagle|Cobalt Disruption**. It remains among the most in-demand collector items in the game.

3. Chroma Case Series

Introduced in 2015, the Chroma cases brought bright, futuristic surfaces to the game and debuted brand-new knife types, consisting of the Karambit, M9 Bayonet, and Butterfly Knife versions with marble and Doppler finishes.

4. Prisma Case Series

Known for introducing dynamic, colorful skins like the **M4A4|Emperor** and the **Five-SeveN|Angry Mob**, Prisma cases likewise featured the Horizon knives with sought after finishes like Emerald and Sapphire.

You can inspect the product in your Steam inventory or examine it in-game. Third-party trading sites and web browser extensions (like CSGO Trader or Steam Inventory Helper) likewise display the precise float worth numerically (varying from 0.00 to 1.00).
