The wear condition is divided into 5 unique classifications:

Wear Condition Drift Value Range Visual Description **Factory New (FN)** 0.00-- 0.07 Beautiful, flawless surface with little to no scratches. **Minimal Wear (MW)** 0.07-- 0.15 Extremely small acnes, typically near the edges or barrel. **Field-Tested (FEET)** 0.15-- 0.38 Visible wear, scratches, and fading. The most common condition. **Well-Worn (WW)** 0.38-- 0.45 Significant wear, heavy scratching, and noticeable paint cracking. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Extremely worn, rusted, or faded. Sometimes valued for distinct "blackimov" results.

Keep in mind: Some skins are "capped," suggesting they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower float variants extremely unusual and pricey.
