1. **Clear the Area:** Keep children and pets far from the space.
2. **Use Protective Gear:** Put on thick work gloves and safety glasses.

3. **Eliminate Loose Glass:** Carefully pull out any alarmingly loose shards from the frame. Do not force glass that is stuck strongly, as this can cause it to shatter further.
4. **Cover the Opening:** Use heavy-duty plastic sheeting or a thick garbage bag, secured with duct tape or painter's tape, to seal the opening from wind, rain, and burglars.

- **Step 4: Cleaning the Rabbet:** The recess where the glass sits (the rabbet) is completely cleaned and covered with linseed oil or primer to avoid the wood from drawing moisture out of the brand-new putty.
- **Step 5: Setting the Glass:** A thin bed of glazing putty is put down, the brand-new glass is pushed carefully into location, and glazier's points are driven in to secure it.
- **Step 6: Applying the Final Seal:** A cool triangle of putty is used around the border of the glass, smoothed out, and delegated cure before painting.
