When removed from the store, their fate is figured out completely by the Steam Community Market.

Popular Camouflage Sets by Biome

1. Snow Biome:

- *Top Picks:* Arctic Suit, Whiteout collection, or the Sub-Zero gear.
- *Why:* Allows gamers to mix seamlessly against snowbanks, making ambushes simpler and leaves cleaner.

2. Desert Biome:

- *Top Picks:* Desert Raiders, Sandstorm, or Nomad sets.
- *Why:* Matches the yellowish-brown terrain of arid regions, separating gamer silhouettes effectively.

3. Forest/ Temperate Biome:

- *Top Picks:* Forest camo, Woodland raider, or leafy tactical variants.
