Common Myths About Moving Contracts

- **Myth:** All moving contracts are the same.
- **Fact:** Contracts differ widely by mover, state, and type of move (local vs. long-distance).
- **Myth:** I'm fully covered if anything is lost or damaged—same as insurance.
- **Fact:** Liability terms in contracts can significantly limit mover responsibility unless you add supplemental insurance.
- **Myth:** Reading the contract closely slows the process and isn't necessary if working with well-known movers.
- **Fact:** Skimming contracts can expose you to unexpected fees or requirements—like truck parking rules or non-allowable items—that can disrupt your move.

Key Contract Sections to Understand

1. Services Covered and Exclusions

Look for a clear list of services included. Does your mover cover packing/unpacking, disassembly of large furniture, or elevator reservations? It may seem obvious, but these extras often come at an additional cost or require prior scheduling.

Southside Moving, for instance, is great about clarifying these up front if you ask. But the contract will spell out any limitations, so your expectations and their offerings line up perfectly.

2. Liability Terms Movers Use

Liability language dictates your mover's financial responsibility in case of damage or loss. Most contracts offer two coverage types:

- **Released Value Protection:** Minimal coverage, usually a few cents per pound per item.
- **Full Value Protection:** More comprehensive but requires additional fees and often strict documentation.

Read this section carefully. The contract might contain many exceptions for fragile items or pre-existing damages. FMCSA's Protect Your Move site has tips on choosing the right protection level for your needs.

3. Non-Allowables and Safety-Based Exclusions

Here's where I get a bit cranky from experience. Many people only reveal flammable liquids, aerosols, or other hazardous materials at the crack of dawn on move day. Movers have strict policies, often outlined in the contract, banning certain items for safety reasons.

Before move day, consult your contract's "non-allowables" list—sometimes taped inside a kitchen cabinet for easy reference! This list might cover:

- Flammable solvents and fuels
- Explosives and fireworks
- Live plants and animals
- Perishable foods
- Certain batteries and chemicals

Knowing these ahead will save delays and rebooking fees.

4. Truck Parking and Building Access Logistics

One of my quirks: I always ask **where the truck will park** before even mentioning boxes. It matters because parking availability influences move timing, elevator bookings, and even crew size.

The contract or attached paperwork usually spells out your obligations to ensure safe and legal parking for the moving truck. If you live in a condo or busy urban area, securing permits or notifying building management might be your responsibility.

5. Measuring Large Furniture and Exits

Labeling rooms in big block letters with painter's tape (another quirk) during the pre-move walk-through is often recommended to streamline unloading and unpacking.

Decluttering also reduces confusion around non-allowables—less stuff can mean less risk for those sneaky forbidden items.

- Review your contract’s weight estimates and volumetric charges.
- Donate, recycle, or sell items ahead of time.
- Consider moving valuables like documents or heirlooms personally for safety.
