- **Beware of Scams:** Because high-tier Rust skins can be worth numerous dollars, targeted phishing scams prevail. Never click suspicious trade links or log into unverified third-party trading websites.
- **Build Around a Theme:** Instead of buying random private pieces, choose a color scheme (e.g., all red, all black, or neon green) and build a cohesive set in time.
