- **Keep a Daily Journal:** Track your efficiency, mood, sleep quality, and any side effects (like dry mouth, headaches, or appetite suppression). Memory can be undependable when trying to summarize an entire week of experiences for your nurse.
- **Buy a Reliable Blood Pressure Monitor:** Your prescriber will require accurate weekly readings of your blood pressure and heart rate. Purchase a verified upper-arm screen rather than a wrist one.
- **Manage Expectations:** Titration is rarely a straight line. You may experience a dosage that makes you feel tense, or one that seems like it not does anything at all. This is all regular data for your prescriber.

- **Prioritize Sleep and Nutrition:** Stimulant medications can suppress hunger and interrupt sleep if taken too late. Eat routine meals (even if you aren't hungry) and take your medication early in the early morning.
- **Communicate Honestly:** Do not try to "difficult out" uneasy side effects. Let your nurse understand right away if something feels incorrect.
