Weapon Rarities and Drop Odds

In addition to the standard wear and rarity tiers, any weapon pulled from a case has an approximately **10% possibility** of being a StatTrak™ variation. These items include a little digital counter attached to the weapon

body that tracks the number of kills made with it. StatTrak products generally command a higher cost on the open market.

Popular Cases Throughout CS History

Over a years, Valve has released lots of cases. Some have actually specified periods of the game, while others are valued for their classic value or high-tier knife finishes.

- **The Arms Deal Collection (2013):** Where it all began. Consisting of the renowned AWP|Asiimov and the initial set of knife surfaces, these early cases are now thought about unusual collector's products.
- **Chroma Case (2015):** Introduced the Doppler, Marble Fade, and Tiger Tooth knife finishes, which stay staples of high-tier trading today.
- **Prisma Case (2019):** Highly popular for introducing Horizon knives with lively color design like Gamma Doppler.
- **Fracture Case (2020):** Known for introducing the Shattered Web knives into routine drop pools, making popular styles more available.

The Economics of Unboxing: Should You Open Cases?

From a purely mathematical viewpoint, **opening CS: GO cases is an unfavorable EV (Expected Value) proposition.**

Since the large bulk of items dropped are Mil-Spec (Blue) or Restricted (Purple) skins worth cs2skin.com just a couple of cents, the average monetary return on a £ 2.50 key is significantly lower than the cost.

Float Values and Skin Condition

When you open a case, the item you receive is assigned a **Float Value** between 0.00 and 1.00. This float determines the wear condition of the skin.

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07 (Minimal to no scratches)
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Slight wear on edges)
- **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.38 (Noticeable scratches and fading)
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant wear)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Heavy damage, often exposing totally various textures)

Certain skins look amazing even in Battle-Scarred condition (often called "blackimovs"), while others look horrible unless they are Factory New. Float worth plays a huge role in figuring out an item's secondary market value.
