How the CS2 Gambling Ecosystem Works

1. Steam API and Peer-to-Peer (P2P) Trading

- The platform matches the player's deposit demand with another user who wants to withdraw that particular skin.

2. Cryptocurrency Integration

- **Dependency and Mental Health:** The gamified nature of opening digital cases and chasing losses can trigger compulsive gambling habits, especially among younger audiences who form the core demographic of CS2.

Secret Safety Precautions for Users
