- **Prize:** Multiple players toss skins into a typical pot. A lottery-style wheel spins, and the overall value of the pot is awarded to a single winner, with higher-value products increasing a gamer's relative share of the wheel.
- **Upgrader:** A risk-based video game where a player picks a skin they wish to win (worth more than their current skin) and rolls a wheel to see if they successfully upgrade.

Comparing CS2 Gambling Game Types

How Deposits and Withdrawals Work

1. Steam API and Peer-to-Peer (P2P) Trading

- **Withdrawals:** When a player wins and wishes to cash out, they choose a skin from the market, and another user sends it to them by means of a direct Steam trade offer.

2. Cryptocurrency and Fiat Integration

- Cryptocurrencies (Bitcoin, Ethereum, GBPT, Litecoin)
- Credit and Debit Cards (Visa/Mastercard)
- E-wallets (Skrill, Neteller)
- Localized payment entrances (depending upon the user's area)
