- **Prize:** Multiple players throw skins into a typical pot. A lottery-style wheel spins, and the total value of the pot is awarded to a single winner, with higher-value items increasing a player's relative share of the wheel.
- **Upgrader:** A risk-based game where a gamer chooses a skin they want to win (worth more than their present skin) and rolls a wheel to see if they effectively upgrade.

Comparing CS2 Gambling Game Types

How Deposits and Withdrawals Work

1. Steam API and Peer-to-Peer (P2P) Trading
