

Hollyville is the kind of place people often pass through without realizing how much story sits just beyond the road shoulder. Tucked into Sussex County, not far from the state's beach corridor and rural farmland, it carries the layered character that makes southern Delaware feel so distinct. The landscape changes gently here. One moment you are on a route lined with pines, utility poles, and modest homes, and the next you are looking at open ground, old trees, and signs that the pace of life has always been a little more measured than in the busier resort towns to the east.
