- **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.38
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00

Some skins look extraordinary even at greater wear values, while others **cs2 case prices** look greatly damaged. Knowing how float values impact cost is crucial if you mean to trade or offer your unboxed products.
