Use Ratings and Float Values

Opening an unusual skin is just half the fight; the condition of the skin dramatically impacts its visual appearance and market value. The game designates every skin a **Float Value** varying from 0.00 to 1.00, which puts the product into one of 5 outside classifications:

1. **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07 (Minimal to no wear)
2. **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Minor scratches or acnes)
3. **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.37 (Noticeable wear and tear)
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.37-- 0.44 (Significant wear on paint and edges)
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.44-- 1.00 (Heavily harmed, often modifying the skin entirely)

The Economy: Supply, Demand, and Discontinuation

The virtual economy surrounding weapon cases mirrors the real life. Valve classifies cases into different drop pools:



- **Active Drop Pool:** Cases currently dropping to players actively playing the game.
- **Rare (Discontinued) Drop Pool:** Older cases that no longer drop routinely to active gamers. They drop at an incredibly low rate (approximated under 1% opportunity per drop) to a tiny fraction of gamers weekly.

As active cases move into the uncommon drop pool, their supply becomes limited. If the gamer base continues to open them, the overall number around decreases. According to standard financial principles, if need stays stable or increases while supply shrinks, the price of the case skyrockets.

Elements Influencing Case Prices

- **Age of the Case:** Older cases are scarcer.
