- **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.38 (Noticeable scratches and fading)
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant wear)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Heavy damage, in some cases revealing totally different textures)

Certain skins look unbelievable even in Battle-Scarred condition (often called "blackimovs"), while others look horrible unless they are Factory New. Float value plays an enormous function in identifying an item's secondary market rate.
