- **Keepsake:** Dropped exclusively throughout official Valve-sponsored esports tournaments (Majors), these skins include gold competition stickers and team logos embedded straight onto the weapon.

What genuinely sets CS: GO skins apart from cosmetics in games like *Fortnite* or *League of Legends* is **real ownership and tradeability**. Valve permits gamers to trade skins peer-to-peer or purchase and offer them on the Steam Community Market, in addition to on third-party marketplace websites.
