- **Appeal:** Simple guidelines and familiar mechanics attract casual and experienced bettors alike.

4. Prize/ Pot Games

- **How it works:** Multiple gamers deposit skins into a collective pot. Each skin contributes tickets based upon its dollar value. A random draw picks a winner, where a greater overall contribution yields a higher statistical chance of winning the whole pot.
- **Appeal:** The ultimate "high-roller" game mode, where single fortunate winners can leave with countless dollars in uncommon digital products.
