Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	

Moderate wear. Scratches and paint breaking ended up being plainly visible on the body and barrel. **Well-Worn (WW)** 0.38-- 0.45 Considerable wear. Major parts of the paint are faded, and heavy scratches are popular. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Incredibly used. The weapon frequently looks greatly rusted, unclean, or nearly entirely removed of paint. *(Note: Some skins look distinctively cool in this condition, making the label "Blackimov").*
