This is where Claude Sonnet 4.6 shines in the ChatHub environment. Developed by Anthropic—a company focused on AI safety—this model is designed to:

- Interpret complex prompts with a bias toward ethical guardrails
- Check assertions made by other models to avoid misinformation
- Flag risky or non-compliant outputs for audit trails and governance

When combined in orchestration workflows—say, via *Sequential mode*—Claude Sonnet 4.6 can review or annotate outputs generated by GPT-5.5 or Gemini 3.1 Pro to reduce unchecked risks. This multi-model validation is vital for teams working on sensitive projects or requiring auditable chains of reasoning.

The Six Orchestration Modes in ChatHub and When to Use Them

5. **Review Mode:** Focus on one model generating content, another reviewing it for errors, compliance, or bias—perfect for high-stakes deliverables needing validation.
6. **Creative Mode:** Emphasizes open-ended, free-flowing interactions primarily with GPT-5.5 or Gemini 3.1 Pro for ideation and storytelling.

When mapped against typical workflows, you can see how Super Mind and Sequential modes act as foundational tools whereas modes like Review and Consensus help with quality assurance and risk reduction.

Deliverables and Exports: How ChatHub Supports Final Output
