3. **Third-Party Trading Sites:** Trusted external marketplaces permit users to buy and sell skins utilizing genuine currency, crypto, or peer-to-peer trading bots. (*Note: Players should constantly work out extreme care and use Steam Guard to prevent frauds*).
4. **Random In-Game Drops:** Simply using authorities or neighborhood servers grants random item drops over time, though these are typically common, low-value items.
