

Massapequa sits in that part of Long Island that still feels personal. It is close enough to New York City for a day trip, yet far enough out that the rhythm changes once you cross onto the South Shore. Streets widen, trees arch over older neighborhoods, the air carries a little more salt, and the pace drops just enough to notice the details.
