- **Coinflip:** A direct player-versus-player (PvP) mode where two users wager equivalent amounts on a digital coin flip, with the winner taking the entire pot.
- **Prize:** Multiple players deposit skins into a main pot. A winner is drawn randomly; the greater the worth of the skins deposited, the greater the analytical opportunity of winning.
- **Esports Betting:** Traditional sportsbooks integrated into gambling sites, enabling users to bet skins or money on professional CS2 matches (ESL, BLAST, Major tournaments).
