

# What should you consider when picking horse feed in 2026?

Picking the right horse feed in 2026 starts with the horse, not the bag. The most suitable option depends on horse nutrition, bodyweight, workload, age, temperament, and metabolic health. A horse that is idle in light work has very different energy requirements from a performance horse, and a good-doer needs a different feeding regime from an underweight horse.

The most important principle is forage before everything else. Forage such as hay and haylage should form the foundation of a balanced diet because it supports gut health, provides quality fibre, and helps maintain a steady digestive process. Concentrated horse feed should then be used only to fill gaps in digestibility, digestible energy, protein, vitamin and mineral intake, or to support condition score.

Always check the sugar and starch level, especially if your horse is prone to laminitis or other metabolic concerns. Lower-starch feeds are often better for horses that need slow release energy rather than a quick burst. A sensible ration is one that matches workload and condition, not one that simply looks “strong” or “complete”.

**Complete horse feed** aims to provide both fibre and concentrated nutrients in one product. It is designed to be fed in smaller amounts than traditional mixes, though “complete” does not mean every horse needs it.

A **horse feed mix recipe** may refer to a custom ration built from forage, a base feed, oats, pellets, balancer, or other ingredients. Homemade mixing can work, but it requires careful attention to horse feeding rules, nutrient balance, and consistent [overweight horse feed](#) measurement. A poorly designed mix can disrupt the balanced diet and lead to excess sugar and starch or nutritional gaps.

It can also be useful where consistent intake matters and where the owner wants a simple feeding regime.
