Valve's Response

Valve has actually intermittently punished the gambling market. In 2016, they provided cease-and-desist letters to various gambling sites, requiring they stop using Steam accounts for commercial gambling. They likewise carried out trade holds, which force a waiting duration on traded products, and tightened up API limitations. Nevertheless, the community is highly resistant; for each site that closes, two regularly appear, creating a "whack-a-mole" dynamic that is tough to cops completely.
