

Bellevue tends to surprise people. Visitors often arrive expecting a polished suburb tucked quietly across the lake from Seattle, then quickly discover a city with its own personality, a layered history, and a built environment that keeps changing without losing sight of its roots. The downtown skyline may be newer than some nearby Eastside communities, but Bellevue is not a place that sprang up overnight.
