Beyond these basic tiers, products can likewise bear the **StatTrak™** technology, which digitally tracks the number of validated kills a gamer makes with that particular weapon, usually driving the cost up considerably.

The Wear and Tear System: Float Values Explained

One of the most fascinating **case opening** aspects of CS: GO skins is that no 2 identical weapons look specifically the exact same. Every weapon is designated a **Float Value** varying from **0.00 to 1.00**, which identifies its physical condition or exterior wear.

The wear value is permanently locked to the product when it is generated and does not deteriorate further through usage.

The Five Exterior Conditions:

1. **Factory New (FN):** Float 0.00-- 0.07. Beautiful, flawless finish with minimal to no scratches.
2. **Very Little Wear (MW):** Float 0.07-- 0.15. Minor imperfections or minor scuffs, generally just noticeable upon close assessment.
3. **Field-Tested (FT):** Float 0.15-- 0.38. Noticeable wear and scratches, balancing price and visual fidelity.

- 4. **Well-Worn (WW):** Float 0.38-- 0.45. Significant paint breaking and heavy wear patterns.
- 5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** Float 0.45-- 1.00. Greatly broken down, in some cases looking rusted, weathered, or practically totally stripped of paint.

Keep in mind: Certain skins-- such as the famous AWP|Asiimov-- do not generate in Factory New condition, making their lowest possible wear states incredibly uncommon and important.

How the Economy Works

The economy surrounding these digital properties operates similarly to a real-world stock market. Prices are dictated purely by supply and need, influenced by several key factors:

- **Pro Player Usage:** If a prominent esports professional starts using a specific skin throughout a significant tournament, the demand for that product normally spikes overnight.
- **Case Availability:** As Valve stops dropping specific older cases actively, the supply of those cases-- and the skins contained within them-- dwindles, causing rates to rise naturally over time.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can trade in ten weapons of one rarity tier for one weapon of the next higher tier, burning items out of circulation and completely altering supply chains.
- **Operation Releases:** Valve-sponsored operations present new thematic collections, briefly flooding or shifting the focus of the marketplace.

Popular Weapon Families to Collect

For gamers aiming to start a collection, specific weapon households have attained famous status within the community due to their creative design and prestige.

- **The Asiimov Series:** Instantly identifiable by its sci-fi, white, black, and intense orange geometric visual. Readily available on the M4A4, AWP, P90, and P250.
- **The Case Hardened Series:** Famous for its mottled blue and gold pattern-index system. Specific rare "Blue Gem" patterns-- where the blade of a knife is practically totally covered in lively blue-- have actually offered for tens of countless dollars.
