1. **API Integration:** A user logs into a gambling website utilizing their Steam credentials by means of OpenID.
2. **Deposit:** The gamer picks products from their Steam inventory to deposit. The site's bot sends a trade offer to the user.

environments, the market eventually adapted by using peer-to-peer (P2P) marketplaces and cryptocurrency as intermediaries.

- **Account Security Measures:** Valve constantly updates its terms of service to prohibit business use of Steam accounts, often targeting and prohibiting automatic bot networks.
