High (Depends on the percentage of the pot owned) **Case Opening** Simulates the official Valve case openings, frequently with greater or customized odds and special reward swimming pools. High (Typically unfavorable go back to player ratios) **Esports Betting** Betting skins or money on professional CS: GO/CS2 matches (e.g., ESL Pro League, Majors) based on live chances. Skill/Knowledge-dependent (Moderate threat)
