6. **Hot Key or Cylinder:** The metal key or the ignition location feels uncommonly hot to the touch after driving, suggesting an electrical brief.

What You *Should* Do:

1. **Put the vehicle in Park (or Neutral for manuals)** and engage the emergency situation brake.
2. **Call a mobile automobile locksmith** instantly.
3. **Keep the broken pieces** of the key. The locksmith can use these fragments to cut a brand-new key on the spot utilizing specialized machinery.
