If a candidate already holds a license from an EU/EEA nation, it is typically recognized up until it expires, though it can be voluntarily exchanged for a Polish one.

For non-EU/EEA license holders (e.g., USA, India, UK post-Brexit, Ukraine), the guidelines are stricter:

- Licenses from nations that signed the **1968 Vienna Convention on Road Traffic** can generally be exchanged straight, though tests might be needed depending upon bilateral agreements and residency period.
- Licenses from countries under the **1949 Geneva Convention** typically need passing the theoretical state exam.
