The wear condition is divided into 5 unique categories:

Wear Condition	Float Value Range	Visual Description
Factory New (FN)	0.00-- 0.07	Beautiful, perfect finish with little to no scratches.
Minimal Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Really small imperfections, normally near the edges or barrel.
Field-Tested (FEET)	0.15-- 0.38	Noticeable wear, scratches, and fading. The most common condition.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Substantial wear, heavy scratching, and noticeable paint chipping.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Very worn, rusted, or faded. In some cases valued for distinct "blackimov" results.

Note: Some skins are "capped," indicating they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower float versions incredibly uncommon and costly.
