Purely luck-based; odds are determined by the platform. **Coinflip** A 1v1 video game where two gamers wager skins of equivalent worth on a virtual coin toss. Winner takes all (minus a site commission). 50/50 chances, based on a platform rake (fee). **Prize** Multiple gamers contribute skins to a typical swimming pool. The greater the worth contributed, the greater the chance of winning the whole pot. Probability-based based upon relative skin worth.

- **Customer Support:** Reliable 24/7 live chat assistance is vital for solving deposit failures, trade hold concerns, or account questions quickly.
